How a gift from you will make a difference:

In order to maintain our independence, Greenpeace does not accept funding from governments or businesses. Instead, we rely solely on gifts from dedicated supporters to fund environmental campaigns.

By pledging a gift to Greenpeace in your Will, you will take action to help this world flourish for generations to come. Your decision will fund environmental activism long into the future.

There are a few different ways you can include Greenpeace in your Will

Leaving a gift to Greenpeace in your Will is a powerful way of helping to pass on a green and peaceful future to the next generation. Although there are many ways to include Greenpeace in your Will, three of the easiest gift types are:

1. A percentage:

This is often regarded as the most flexible and effective way to give. You don't need to adjust the value of your gift over time to account for inflation, or any changes to your total assets.

2. A residuary:

This is a gift of whatever is left in your estate after you have taken care of your loved ones.

3. Fixed amount (or a specific sum):

Whilst a fixed amount means you are able to declare the size of the gift you want to make, it can also mean you want to change it over the years to account for inflation or changes in your circumstances.

Sample wording to leave a gift to Greenpeace:

To leave a gift to Greenpeace in your Will, please note it is important that you use our full legal name: Greenpeace Aotearoa Incorporated.

"I give Greenpeace Aotearoa Inc. (currently registered with Charity Services Ngā Ratonga Kaupapa Atawhai with registration number CC58459)% of my estate OR the rest and residue of my estate OR the sum of \$.....(fixed amount) for the purposes of Greenpeace Aotearoa Inc. and particularly including in support of campaigning for the climate and biodiversity. I declare that this gift shall be free of any tax or probate or estate duties payable upon or in consequence of my death, and the receipt of the Executive Director, Treasurer or another authorised officer of Greenpeace Aotearoa Inc. shall be sufficient discharge to my executors."

To ensure your wishes are met it is important that you speak to a legal advisor.

Celebrating a good old lefty, Pauline Fraser, 1916 - 2009

Born in 1916, Pauline grew up in an idyllic village in England. Her upbringing was one of profoundly Christian and traditional English conventions. Whilst at Oxford University, in the 1930's, she developed an enthusiasm for left-wing politics and as her ideas changed she saw radical alternatives to the status quo.

Pauline came to New Zealand at the end of 1950, and for 50 years she lived overlooking the Manukau Harbour. She once said that moving to New Zealand was the best decision she had ever made.

She said she had truly become a New Zealander when she came to feel that the wee wooden neogothic churches dotted all around the country were not just amusing and cute, but beautiful and perfect in their place. A truly generous person, Pauline remained committed to her ideologies throughout her life. As a citizen of the world, she was concerned about our planet and strived to do good in progressive ways.

From the 80's, she actively supported Greenpeace and left a generous gift in her Will. This gift has made positive change possible for a world Pauline cared deeply for.
