
YOU'RE STANDING UP FONTERRA & BIG DAIRY

> Your passion for protecting wildlife is driving our campaign against Fonterra and the intensive dairy industry.

Fonterra's massive use of palm kernel, a product of the palm industry which contributes to the destruction of rainforests in Southeast Asia and is threatening the habitat of species like orangutans as well as driving dairy intensification here in Aotearoa, has got to end.

New Zealand is the biggest importer of palm kernel in the world, thanks to Fonterra's dirty dairy. The palm industry is destroying the homes of innocent wildlife, including baby orangutans. Fonterra profits from that because palm kernel allows NZ Big Dairy to sustain more cows than grass alone can feed.






Palm kernel is used as extra feed on Fonterra's dirty dairy farms because they are so crammed with cows that there isn't even enough grass left to feed them all. As a result of all those cows, Fonterra and Big Dairy is also New Zealand's biggest climate and fresh water polluter.

The misleading information on Fonterra's packaging is a disservice to many farmers and brands that have done the work to end their use of palm kernel. Fonterra is stuck in the past and misleading its customers by trying to hide behind greenwash. They are trying to gloss over the fact that their farming practices may be part of orangutans and other rare species being pushed to the edge of extinction.

Thanks to supporters like you, we're calling on Fonterra to stop the use of palm kernel on its farms, and move towards sustainable practices that protect both biodiversity and the climate.

New Zealand's oceans and the incredible
creatures that call them home. From
vibrant coral reefs to majestic whales,
your generosity is making a real difference
in protecting our blue planet.

With your backing, we're standing strong against the threat of seabed mining, an industry that will endanger unique marine habitats and creatures. Despite years of Greenpeace and other groups keeping seabed mining out of the waters of the South Taranaki Bight, wannabe mining companies like Trans-Tasman Resources (TTR) have been emboldened to attempt mining again thanks to the Fast Track Approvals Bill. The generosity of people like you means we can continue to stand against TTR's attempts to start destroying the seabed here. On September 24,

Greenpeace activists occupied the Wellington offices of TTR's lobby group Straterra in protest of their plans, with three activists locking themselves inside the building, and two more climbing onto the front of the building to deploy a large 'No Seabed Mining' banner.

And hours after the occupation of Straterra's offices, two more brave activists scaled a tower near Parliament and dropped a 22-metre banner also reading No Seabed Mining.

This action was a demonstration of the resistance promised in a recently published open letter to all companies considering using the Fast Track Approvals process. While in the office, the activist also unfurled a large document with the names of the more than 7,500 people who signed on to the letter.

If you were one of them, thank you!

Your gifts are also making an international impact, as we're amplifying the voices of Pacific nations opposing deep sea mining in the Pacific.

At the same time in the Arctic, the Norwegian Government is opening up deep and wild waters to deep sea mining exploration.


Our Nordic and German colleagues set sail with a group of scientists to the mining area to expose how whale and dolphin species could be impacted by this destructive industry. Whales and dolphins live and feed in the same deep sea area that the Norwegian government is opening for mining, and are highly sensitive to industrial activities and noise pollution. With your help, I know our international community can protect these animals.

Back closer to home, ship crews have been hard at work documenting the damage caused by bottom trawling on the Emperor Seamounts in the North Pacific. Their research—funded by supporters like you—adds momentum to our call for new marine protected areas, which will safeguard 30% of the world's oceans by 2030.

TEST THEIR DRINKING WATER

Thanks to your generosity, we've been able to around where nitrate contamination is most free run water testing events across the country, particularly in regions where nitrate contamination from intensive dairy farming is a concern. No one should have to worry about whether the water from their tap is safe to drink, and your support is helping us tackle this growing problem.

A growing body of scientific evidence has found links between nitrate contamination of water and a host of potential health impacts, from bowel cancer to premature births.

New Zealand scientists warn that people in rural areas are the most likely to be exposed to hazardous levels of nitrate. Our water testing programme helps New Zealanders understand 8 their risks, contributes to a body of research severe, and raises awareness to pressure the Government to make drinking water safe for all.

We'll continue to offer free water testing, so keep an eye on our website for future events. You can also mail in your water sample to find out if it's polluted-no matter where you live in New Zealand.





Your voice is a lifeline for seabirds, dolphins, turtles, and other marine creatures threatened by plastic pollution. With your help, we're pushing for a future where single-use plastics are a thing of the past.

Because of you, we're able to sustain the fight for a strong Global Plastics Treaty, and we're building momentum toward banning unnecessary single-use plastic bottles. Together, we're demanding change from companies like Coca-Cola, which pumps out billions of plastic bottles each year.

The final UN negotiations for a Global Plastics Treaty will take place in Busan, South Korea from November 25 to December 1, 2024. We are single-use plastic.
