CAMPAIGNS IN ACTION

DEEP SEA MINING

The last few months have been busy for the team, especially to do with stopping seabed mining. Firstly, a group of volunteer activists locked down the office of Straterra, the mining lobbyist group for Trans Tasman Resources (TTR) the company aiming to be the first in the world to launch deep sea mining off the coast of Taranaki. Then a few weeks later another group of activists attended the annual general meeting for Manuka resources, the Australian company that owns TTR. With them were respected representatives of Taranaki iwi Ngāti Ruanui. Each time we had one singular message 'NO SEABEAD MINING!"





AGRICULTURE

This last quarter we launched our campaign against Fonterra for their invasive dairy industry making Aotearoa's the worst climate polluter. Seven brave Greenpeace activists climbed the Te Rapa factory to unfurl two giant banners announcing a unified message saying, "Fonterra's methane cooks the climate". Then a few weeks later another team of volunteer activists ensembled a giant puzzle outside of Fonterra's Auckland office during their shareholders meeting. With an addition message calling on shareholders to divest in Fonterra because of their destructive use of palm kernel in their cattle feed.
